The art of standing apart

It's time to celebrate a particular independent streak in the history of American art, or so says the Milwaukee Art Museum.

"Uncommon Folk: Traditions in American Art" will feature a selection of paintings, drawings, sculptures, photographs, textiles, furniture and decorative arts made by artists who operated outside the established norms of the art world — artists who followed paths outside art historical movements, according to the museum.

The Milwaukee Art Museum, 700 N. Art Museum Drive, will present works from its collection of folk and self-taught art from the late 19th and early 20th centuries in this show, which opens Friday. There will be a 12-hour preview for museum members from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Thursday.
