Dear Members,

Welcome to a new year. The Milwaukee Art Museum marked a historic moment for our city in September when we welcomed Santiago Calatrava back to the building he designed 20 years ago, now an icon for Milwaukee and the Museum's largest work of art. His visit gave us new inspiration as we look ahead to the coming year and envision where we want to be in another 20 years' time.

Two key additions to the Museum's senior leadership team will be invaluable in shaping the future of our Museum. Chief Curator Elizabeth Siegel and Chief Development Officer André Allaire join the staff in January. Siegel comes to us from the Art Institute of Chicago, and Allaire, from the Parsons School of Design.

The importance of relationships is a theme that carries through our exhibitions this season. From the connection between an architect and the city that celebrates his remarkable vision to that between our present and our past, relationships shape who we are. The relationship between the United States and the Nordic countries is at the center of the international exhibition we coorganized with the Los Angeles Contemporary Museum of Art: Scandinavian Design and the United States, 1890–1980. We open the exhibition in March following its premiere at Stockholm's Nationalmuseum and its recent

celebrated reception at LACMA. It is the first exhibition to examine a century of cultural exchanges between the U.S. and Scandinavian countries, expanding the story of modern American design. Opening in February, *Native America: In Translation*, curated by the Apsáalooke artist Wendy Red Star, features 10 contemporary artists who consider the relationship between photography and Indigenous cultures today.

Alongside these compelling presentations, we're excited to foster creativity at Family Sundays, watch the galleries come alive with Art in Bloom, and welcome Rebecca Belmore, a Lac Seul First Nation (Anishinaabe) artist, for an Expert Series conversation. On our website, we recently launched many improvements that extend the Museum's mission to create moments of discovery. I invite you to deepen your relationship with art with us and the many experiences we offer you in the year ahead.

Scandinavian Design and the United States, 1890-1980

March 24-July 23, 2023 | Baker/Rowland Galleries

Scandinavian Design and the United States, 1890-1980 is the first exhibition to explore the extensive design exchanges between the United States and Denmark, Sweden, Finland, Norway, and Iceland during the 20th century. The exhibition proposes an alternative to the dominant narrative that cites Germany and central Europe as the primary influences of modern American design, presenting new scholarship on the crucial impact the Scandinavian countries and America had on one another's material culture. From this perspective, Scandinavian Design investigates timely themes such as the contributions of immigrants to their adopted societies, the importance of international exchange, the role of cultural myths, and designing for sustainability and accessibility.

Spanning from the arrival of Nordic immigrants to the U.S. in the late 19th century through the environmentally and socially conscious design movements of the 1960s and 1970s, the exhibition showcases more than 180 objects, including furniture, textiles, drawings, ceramics, jewelry, glass, and product designs that reflect the far-reaching effects of the Scandinavian and American cultural exchange. Highlights of the presentation include Paulding Farnham's Viking

Punch Bowl (ca. 1893) for Tiffany & Co. and a study for the woven hanging Festival of the May Queen (1932) by Eliel Saarinen and Loja Saarinen, which documents motifs most recently seen in the 2019 film Midsommar.

Scandinavian Design and the United States, 1890–1980 is co-organized by the Milwaukee Art Museum and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art in collaboration with the Nationalmuseum Sweden and the Nasjonalmuseet in Norway.

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

In Native America: In
Translation, 10 artists consider
Indigenous histories, cultures,
and representation through a
contemporary lens.
Photography, a medium
historically used to suppress
and stereotype Native cultures,
is reclaimed by these artists,
who are, in the words of the
curator Wendy Red Star,
"opening up space in the art
world for new ways of seeing
and thinking."

The exhibition highlights the featured artists' perspectives on community, identity, heritage, and the legacy of colonialism on the American continents. Among them, Martine Gutierrez used the fashion magazine format to question the social construction of identity in her work Indigenous Woman. In nindinawemaganidog (all my relations), Rebecca Belmore combined symbolic elements from her past performance works to call attention to violence perpetrated by governments against Native people. And in photographs unique to the Milwaukee Art Museum's presentation, Tom Jones beaded portraits of people from his community with patterns referencing their Ho-Chunk cultural traditions.

Native America: In Translation is curated by Wendy Red Star, an Apsáalooke artist whose work was included in the Museum's recent exhibition On Repeat: Serial Photography. The Native Initiatives Advisory Group at the Museum was instrumental in helping develop the programs we are offering in conjunction with this exhibition.

2023 Scholastic Art Awards: Wisconsin Exhibition

Feb 4-March 19, 2023 | Schroeder Galleria

This year marks the 100th anniversary of the national Scholastic Art Awards program, which acknowledges excellence in the visual arts and encourages the artistic endeavors of young people throughout the United States. The Milwaukee Art Museum has hosted the awards for the Wisconsin region since 1976, sharing the extraordinary talents of students in grades 7-12 for the entire community to celebrate at its annual exhibition. For the 2023 Scholastic Art Awards exhibition, we will not only present more than 250 artworks by students from across our state but also highlight past awards recipients represented in the Museum's collection, including Harry Bertoia, Robert Indiana, Cy Twombly, John Wilde, and Andy Warhol.

The exhibition features works spanning mediums from painting to design. A jury of regional arts professionals, including artists, university faculty, and gallerists, selects the works from approximately 2.500 submissions across 16 categories: Architecture & Industrial Design, Ceramics & Glass, Comic Art, Design, Digital Art, Drawing & Illustration, Editorial Cartoon, Expanded Projects, Fashion, Film & Animation, Jewelry, Mixed Media, Painting, Photography, Printmaking, and Sculpture. The Silver Key Award denotes statewide recognition. Artworks awarded a Gold Key later compete at the national level in New York. Historically, many award winners go on to achieve distinction in the fine arts, applied arts, and design, often crediting their success to the early recognition they received as participants in Scholastic.

Collection Highlight: A Monumental Return

After more than a year of planning, *Carousel Merge 2*, an early draped canvas painting the artist Sam Gilliam made in 1971, is now on view in the contemporary art galleries. The important work hangs alongside other monumental sculptures and sculptural paintings from the Museum's collection, including Rashid Johnson's *Untitled Anxious Audience* (2017) and Robert Morris's *Untitled* (1970), visible in the picture below.

Gilliam (1933–2022), one of the most influential and innovative artists of his generation, passed away last June. The Museum's painting is from a series the artist began in 1968 that came to define his career. Gilliam's so-called sculptural paintings or drape paintings, large unstretched canvases suspended from the ceiling, pushed the limits of painting beyond the frame. Reflecting on the series, he said, "Paint and

surface took on an added, third-dimensional reality. Now the canvas was not only the means to, but a primary part of, the object." In 1972, Gilliam became the first Black artist to represent the United States at the Venice Biennale when the U.S. Pavilion featured a selection of these paintings.

The Museum (then the Milwaukee Art Center) first showed *Carousel Merge 2* in an exhibition in 1971 and has presented the painting in different galleries since acquiring it in 1975. This recent installation involved the Museum's registration, preparation, and conservation teams, as well as representatives from the Sam Gilliam Studio in Washington, DC. 
